

#### **Jacobstow Neighbourhood Watch**

In March Devon & Cornwall Police has been supporting the National Police Chiefs' Council campaign, 'Is Your Vision Roadworthy?', which highlights motorists' legal obligation to make sure their vision is sufficient when behind the wheel. Over a five-year period between 2013 and 2017, the DVLA received 857,896 health notifications relating to changes in eyesight. Chief Inspector Ben Asprey, of the Devon & Cornwall roads policing unit, said: "We're supporting the 'Is Your Vision Roadworthy' campaign which aims to reduce collisions on our roads."The majority of the information needed by drivers on the roads is visual, so it's really important that motorists have regular eye tests as vision can decline gradually over time. Eye experts recommend all motorists have their eyes tested every two years, unless advised otherwise by their optician. We're urging everyone to make sure they have regular eyesight tests, and to check that friends and older relatives are getting tested regularly too. Drivers who fail to



meet the required standards are not only breaking the law, they're putting themselves and other road users at risk."Under legislation known as 'Cassie's Law', drivers who fail a roadside number plate test could have their licence revoked on the spot if a police officer deems them to be unsafe to be on the road.

#### Help the Hedgehogs

Around this time of year, hedgehogs are waking from hibernation and desperately hungry. Before you feed hedgehogs, do your research so you can avoid foods that can make them ill. "hedgehog Most available for purchase is expensive, unregulated, and full of ingredients such as cereal and mealworms, which agonising can cause terminal metabolic bone disease. Never feed

hedgehogs cows' milk! Most hedgehogs are dangerously lactose intolerant, so a saucer of milk is likely to make them ill.

Hedgehogs are nocturnal, so if you see one out in the day, he or she is probably ill or injured, and it's vital that you take the animal to a reputable local rescue. Occasionally, female hedgehogs may be out foraging for their young in daylight, but this only happens during the very short nights of June and July, and they will be moving purposefully.

Please make sure there's a gap in any garden fencing so that hedgehogs can get through – they roam over a large area every night, so this is important. Remember that a "tidy" garden is unwelcoming to hedgehogs, so leave piles of old logs and leaves while keeping as much of your garden wild..

Avoid using slug pellets, as these may be harmful to hedgehogs. Contrary to popular belief, hedgehogs only eat slugs when they are starving, and doing so can give them lungworm. Their natural diet consists of caterpillars, beetles, and small insects, but sadly, the mania for pristine gardens, impregnable fencing, and Astroturf mean these they are in short supply – hence why hedgehog rescues have to cope with so many starving hedgehogs these days. This is why we need to keep some messy areas in our gardens.

And as these lovely posters put up by villagers say, please slow down so that you have more


time to react if you see a hedgehog pottering along the lanes.



#### **SPRING GARDENING**

Spring is here! Daffodils and crocus are welcoming the longer Spring days and tulips are beginning to show. Compost comes into its own at this time of year and when the weather is dry enough, fork it into the

soil, removing any weeds. Green manure can be sown into empty areas to improve soil fertility, in preparation for courgettes, sweetcorn and tomatoes that won't be planted out

until later.

April and May are busy months for vegetable growers. As soon as the first shoots of early potato crops show, start earthing up to protect them from any late frosts. Indoor-raised seedlings need



hardening off before planting outside and be prepared to cover young plants outside if cold weather is forecast overnight. Continue sowing leeks, summer cauliflower and cabbage indoors or in an outdoor seedbed ready for transplanting later on. When conditions are good, begin succession planting of salad leaves, peas, beetroot etc to maintain a good supply. Prepare supports for french beans, runner beans and peas. May is a good time to start greenhouse crops - peppers, tomatoes etc and outside, plant out your courgettes, sweetcorn and squashes.

#### **Happy Gardening!**

#### **BEING GREENFINGERED AND GREEN**

As Gardeners, it's important that we play our part to Reduce, Reuse and Recycle and to keep our carbon footprints as low as possible. The use of peat products is diminishing in the shops and garden centres but we can help by checking what we're buying, especially online and from general stores. It remains difficult to avoid plastic pots, labels and compost bags but gardeners are usually pretty good at re-using these. If you do end up with too many, consider donating them to school or

charity projects or offering them on Recycling websites.



The hosepipe ban remains in place in Cornwall so collect as much rainwater as possible now to sustain our garden needs later in the year. However large your water reserve, it soon disappears during hot, dry weather when our plants need it. For larger plants and shrubs, try cutting off the end of a plastic bottle, part-burying it neck down near the plant and watering into the

bottle. This reduces evaporation and the moisture is delivered directly to the plant's roots.

If you have a top recycling or water saving tip, do let us know!

#### HAPPY EASTER.

On Easter, Christians celebrate the victory of life over death with the resurrection of Jesus and thus the central event of their religion. In Christian doctrine, the derivation of Easter seems to come from the East. This is because the women who were the first to stand at Jesus' empty tomb were looking east towards the sunrise.

According to some sources, the Easter bunny first arrived in America in the 1700s with German immigrants who settled in Pennsylvania and transported their tradition of an egg-laying hare called "Osterhase" or "Oschter Haws." Their children made nests in which this creature could lay its coloured eggs.

Good Friday is called Good Friday because whilst it is sad, it is also good because it reflects on the day that Jesus sacrificed his own life so that everyone could be forgiven their sins and start anew.





Both Good Friday and Easter Sunday are what some Christians call a "movable feast". This means that they happen on a different day each year. It is always celebrated sometime between 21st March and 25th April, but when exactly depends on the cycle of the moon. This is because Easter is always celebrated on the first Sunday after the full moon that falls on or just after the 21st March, which is considered the start of Spring. Spring is important as it represents the flourishing of new life after the harsh cold of the winter.

#### WEATHERWISE by Monitor

By the time you read this we will be into early spring. January started off with very mild conditions, 13°C being typical of the first week, with 13.9°C reached here in the valley at Canworthy Water on the 5th. With a winter noted as being without any named storms, but hardly a dry start, 0.61" of rain being collected on the 3rd. Another wet day on the 7th, the brisk southwesterly winds picked up in the afternoon and continued into the 8th, when squalls and small hail on veering winds with a thunderstorm was noted locally in the early evening.

The 11th was not a day to be outside for long. Rain showers and squally winds from early, a persistent thunderstorm was observed offshore to the west of our north coast around 0940, it intensified and tracked inland later in the morning with a separate cell Holsworthy by mid-morning. Some torrential downpours were noted up to midday, with 23 lightning strikes recorded here but nothing really local as such.

Wet conditions continued into mid week, the period 14th through to the evening of the 16th collected 2.12" of rain although most of the latter day's rain was overnight. Needless to say The Ottery wasn't going to put up with this, and some local road and field flooding were observed locally here.

Matters cooled down considerably by late on the 19th, with much colder conditions the following day and light showers of snow pellets were recorded early along with a frost and icing from overnight. Frosts were observed with calmer weather as the pressure rose in the last week of the month, although day maximum temperatures were reasonable being 8-9°C typically.

Rainfall collected was average for January, being 5.92" as against my 10 year average of 5.53"

February didn't fill dykes this year. A dominant area of high pressure became established early in the month and by the 5th, the barometer had risen to 1048mb, something we haven't seen in Cornwall for quite a while. Matters stayed like it with virtually no rain of note into mid-month, only some coastal drizzle some days. Very few frosts except on the 8th, and by the 19th the high had warmed somewhat with height and 14.3°C was noted on the 17th. A slight change of short duration was observed on the 22nd, with a brief heavy rain shower and for unknown reasons an offshore thunderstorm was recorded off the peninsular late pm which was odd.

On the 26th, a strong solar storm along with geomagnetic disturbance produced a bright Aurora visible locally which is an un-common sight this far south. This was only the second one I personally have observed in 20 or so years.

A very dry month, just 1.05" of rain was collected here, as against my 10 year average of 4.47". We do get them from time to time, both 2012 and 2018 were similar.

A quick search on Cornwall Council's website for Potholes takes you straight to the appropriate page. You then just follow the instructions below. I reported the mahoosive pot hole up by the Jubilee Bench on Edgar Road and found it very straight forward. People power counts here: the more people that report these tyre mashing booby traps the quicker they will, hopefully, be repaired. Below is copied from the Council website

#### Making a report

Search for the location of the problem using a postcode or first line of the address This will drop a pin onto the map. Click on the map to make sure the pin is in the right location on a road, highway, or pavement

Then click on the pin to see the form options.

#### **RED POST-A HAUNTED PLACE?** (Extracts taken from Scarey Southwest)

Red Post, between Bude and Launceston was the site of many hangings and as such, possible hauntings. The Red Post signpost, marks the crossroad of the A3072 Holsworthy to Stratton road with the B3254 Launceston to Kilkhampton road. Red Post has appeared on maps since around 1817. During this time the area became a site for a wharf for Bude Canal and a brick and tile kilnwork. The nearby Red Post Service Station and the Red Post Inn and Tourist Park take their name from the iconic Red Post. There has been an Inn on this site since the 9th Century, and the Inn was once a place where smugglers notoriously



frequented. This site is also of important geographical significance due to the adjacent bronze age burial barrows, found near Red Post.

One of the reasons signposts such as this were painted red was to mark the site of a gallows, and the Red Post signpost does indeed mark a place where public executions took place over many centuries. To deter other people, many bodies were often gruesomely left to rot at Red Post. During the Middle Ages, crossroads were used as a place to bury people who had died by suicide as suicide was considered a crime. Also, witches, especially old women, were buried at crossroads as the parish would have nothing to do with their burials. The last hanging at Red Post took place in the mid 1800's for sheep stealing. In Folklore, crossroads have much significance as they are known as a place between the worlds, also known as a 'liminal' place – it is where paranormal activity can occur, where pacts can be made with demons or devils and where other supernatural entities can be contacted.

#### Warbstow Bury

A large double ringed hillfort on the slopes of a hill in Warbstow, the second largest in Cornwall and perhaps the best preserved. The fort consists of two complete rings of massive ditch and banks, the outer walls of which are almost covered with gorse and bracken, with deep ditches at the bottom of each rampart. There is also an incomplete third ring around approximately half of the fort in between the outer and inner ramparts. Two entrances are opposite each other at the northwest and southeast



through both rings, while a third entrance at the southwest is only through the outer defences.

At the centre of the fort is a large mound, 22 metres long known as the Giant's Grave or King Arthur's Tomb, which is possibly the remains of a neolithic long barrow, or perhaps a medieval rabbit warren.

During the Second World War the Home Guard had a lookout and a Tommy gun for shooting down enemy aircraft. The men manning the hut reported that they could see search lights as far away as the coast of Wales again proving the importance of this place as a vantage point, undoubtedly why it was chosen as the site for the hillfort all those thousands of years ago. There is a small carpark beside the southeastern entrance, and a signboard which gives much information about the place. Access to the fort is open to all. Postcode for nearby the site is PL15 8UZ or What Three Words is booth marsh.commutes.



"Tourists in search of the magnificent and the beautiful should pay a visit to these wondrous heights, where will burst upon their delighted vision an expanse of country extending from the quiet little haven of Bude to the hills of Dartmoor stretching grandly across the distant horizon. Glorious!"




