The Parish Council meets in the Parish Hall on the 1st Tuesday of every month (except for August). Meetings commence at 7.30 pm. Members of the Public are welcome to attend but any items for inclusion on the Agenda should be submitted to the Parish Clerk at least 10 days before the meeting. There is an opportunity to raise questions at the beginning and end of the Council meeting but questions (and answers) raised at these times are not recorded in the minutes.

<u>Editor's Note</u> The report on each month's Parish Council meeting is a summary prepared by the Parish Clerk. <u>We have omitted certain minor items for brevity</u> but a full version of the minutes is displayed on the Parish Hall notice board (after formal approval) at the following month's Parish Council meeting also the Agenda and Minutes of previous meetings are on the village website www.jacobstowvillage.co.uk

Summary of minutes of meeting held on 6th February 2024

Councillor Charmaine Smith chaired the monthly meeting with five Councillors, the Clerk and one member of the public attending.

<u>English Heritage</u> – Letter received from English Heritage saying English Heritage Trust's funds are limited but Penhallym is on the programme for renewal.

<u>Planning Application PA23/09863</u> – Outline Planning for a proposed dwelling with all matters reserved - Dovedale Broad Langdon, Jacobstow. Councillors support this.

<u>Planning Application PA23/09829</u> – Proposed change of use and conversion of barn to dwelling house together with reconstruction of existing garage to bat roost. Councillors support this.

<u>Planning Application No PA23/10339</u> – Temporary siting of mobile home for agricultural worker - Land South of Tobarn, Jacobstow. - Councillors support this

<u>Planning Application No PA23/17589</u> – Erection of Slurry Store, Broadlands Farm, Jacobstow. - Councillors object to this Application. Reply saying they require more information on this Slurry Store. There is insufficient data. What are the dimensions. What is its construction and what is the Slurry ratio.

<u>Bus Shelter</u>. – It was brought to the Council's attention that the bus shelter needs cleaning. This will be looked into.

Jacobstow Parish Council Summary of Minutes of Meeting held on 5th March, 2024

Cllr. Charmaine Smith chaired the monthly meeting with six Councillors, County Cllr. Nicky Chopak, the Clerk and eight members of the public attending. As this was the Annual Parish Meeting it began with two speakers. The first was Miss Lisa Garside, acting head of Jacobstow School who gave an update on the school. The second was a report from County Cllr Nicky Chopak on the Cornwall Council year.

This was followed by the normal monthly Council meeting. It was reported that a post was broken on Footpath No 6. Cllr. John Shepherd to inspect this.

Age Concern will be running a bus to the Royal Cornwall Show on Saturday 8th June, 24. Anyone interested can contact the Clerk tor details.

Planning – Eden Chapel - The purchaser of Eden Chapel attended the meeting to show plans of how they wish to convert the Chapel into living accommodation. The Parish Hall committee had confirmed that Broadband can be installed in the Hall. Cllr. Chapman to find out how this can be done and the cost.

In February I had the honour of attending the Cornwall Apprenticeship Awards at the Eden Project. I was also invited to present the award for Academic Mentor of the Year, which was won by Tamzin Irvin - congratulations again, Tamzin! The event was organised by Truro and Penwith College, in



partnership with Hertzian, Pirate FM, Business Cornwall and sponsors from across the Cornish business community. They did a brilliant job. I'm so chuffed to see apprentices getting recognition for the vital work they do in our communities. I'm very grateful to the Premier League for funding £50,000's worth of new solar panels for Launceston FC. 



BEING GREEN - LET'S REDUCE!

We all know the Green mantra "Reduce, Re-use & Recycle" but often "Reduce" is overlooked and whilst we enthusiastically fill up our recycling bags every fortnight, there is an urgent need to reduce what we bring home in the first place. Plastics in particular remain a major problem, often ending up in landfill and whilst there are biodegradable plastic wrappers and trays, many still take a very long time to disintegrate or are too expensive for companies to use.



Could you reduce the number of plastic containers in your shopping? Some Brands and Supermarkets are clearly working to replace plastic packaging, using carboard trays for fruits and vegetables for example, although it seems like a very slow process and without making changes to our shopping habits, the mountain of plastics continues to grow.

Buying from local markets, farmshops, refill shops etc is one option to reduce the packaging

we bring home, as paper bags are often used and some allow the re-use of our containers from home. Toiletries are another product invariably using plastic containers - have you tried hair shampoo and

conditioning bars? These are usually packed in a cardboard box and as their popularity has increased, the choice and quality of the products has much improved. They take up much less room when you're packing for a trip away too!



By considering what our parents and grandparents used in the past, we can see the advantage of using simpler cleaning products, made at home



that are both effective and also very cheap. They probably used Bicarbonate of Soda and vinegar for example, for removing limescale and soap residue, stain removal and floor cleaning. There are many tv shows, blogs and magazine articles that advocate some of these forgotten cleaning ingredients, hopefully setting new trends that will save us all money and be kinder to the environment than the chemical cleaners sold in the Supermarkets.

January can be a month of extremes, and this one was no exception. It started very mild and wet, 1.85", 47mm had been collected here by the 3rd. 13.5°C was recorded on the 2nd, which was also notable for a very spiteful squall that went through late morning associated with a vigorous cold front. The wind had been a fairly moderate westerly from overnight on the previous day, with 13°C early. The wind picked up rapidly by 11.30 giving very strong gusts into the early afternoon, 46 knots was observed here at 11.50, a severe gust of 76.76 knots, 88.3 mph was recorded at Gull Rock, Treknow with other stations recording 60+ knot gusts, it calmed down quickly by 13.00. Quite alarming while it lasted.

Matters started to cool down by the 6th, this marked the beginning of a cold period that lasted until the 20th. Many mornings had a frost of sorts, a severe frost was observed here on the 18th at -5°C, light snow flurries were reported along the southern coasts of Cornwall on the 9th. Generally dry here, some days gave light wintry showers but nothing of note.

The mild conditions returned towards the end of the month, 14°C was recorded here on the 29th.

A total rainfall of 4.38", 111mm was collected at Canworthy Water, this was against my 10 year average of 4.98", 126.5mm. No particular trend observed, quite typical for the county.

February was wet. It started in earnest overnight on the 6th into the following day, with 0.93" having been collected by the morning here. Further rain was observed on the 8th giving another 3/4", this got the Ottery going nicely with the usual road trouble spots flooding. It never really stopped for the rest of the month. Only the 12th was actually completely dry, and by the end of February a total of 8.5", 216mm had been collected here, against my 10 year average of 4.45", 113mm. A couple of days were almost spring-like, 15°C on the 14th, and 16.3°C the following day.


A little bit of History from Jacobstow Church Diary

1827 the west aisle should be plastered overhead same as the middle aisle.

Meetings to be held in the Belfry while Vestry repaired

In 1828 a new bridge over the splash at Churchtown built for £2.50. A teak beam from the Tower to be used

1829 The Tower to be re-pointed using Dozmary pool sand. The Pinnacle should be fastened with iron crampon and roof repaired all by end of August.



1829 More road works. All described precisely, right down to saying no mud or dirt on road!

1830 New seating is ordered from John Hoskin, carpenter of Stratton for £104 exacting conditions.

Here are some of 25 parameters.

Pews to be level across top, 3 feet 10 inches high from the stone floor.

The framework is to be 1/4 inch thick when worked. The tiles 3/2 inches wide , the rails 3/2 inches wide except at the bottom rail which is to be 4 inches wide. The frame to be mortised into the Sleepers. 1835 The Parishioners to pay towards the purchase of houses at Sowercott £60.

Once one gets your eye in the diary makes fascinating reading.

CREATING MY PAINTING - "HARBOURS & SEA WALLS" by Celia Proudfoot

At 72 years old, it really is a wonderful feeling to know you have done your best work. I trained at art school in London, sold some work in galleries, worked as a photographer and then trained as a teacher. Moving to Cornwall, having a family, playing in a band and holding



down a job meant I never had the time or creative energy to do any serious art work. Even in retirement, time was taken up with house renovations and when Covid hit, even though I had all the time in the



world, it just made me very depressed. I missed my family.

On my 70th birthday, I resolved to start painting again but I

was very cautious and played safe, working small and pretty and nothing felt like the real me. After Christmas, I popped over to a



friend's house. They had just bought a large painting to go in their new extension. I thought, "That's what I'm supposed to be doing and I can do it as well or better." I ordered a 100x100cm canvas and as soon as I started drawing on it in

charcoal, I felt alive. I am always trying to capture that sense of being surrounded by space you get walking the beaches. I looked at Cornish abstract painters for inspiration.

The Knockers of Cornwall. Taken From Scary South West Facebook page.



The Knockers are supernatural creatures of Cornish Folklore who inhabited the dark corners of Cornish tin mines. Some people also believed they lived in wells and in caves & rocky outcrops along the Cornish coast. Many Cornish people were of the opinion that the Knockers were the spirits of tin miners who had sadly died in the mines. For those who claimed to have seen the Knockers, they said they had skinny legs and arms, with huge, hooked noses on a large head, but were tiny in stature, and they wore similar clothing to the miners. Other names – Knacker, in Wales they are

known as Coblynau, and in America they are known as The Tommyknockers (believed to have been taken to Pennsylvania by immigrant Cornish and Welsh Tin Miners in the 1820's). Who remembers Stephens King's 1987 horror novel of the same name? Where did that name, 'Knockers', come from? - the Knockers were thought to knock on the walls of the mines to tell the miners a disaster was about to happen such as a cave-in, and some believed their knocking would lead the miners to good veins of tin. Alternatively, some thought the Knockers deliberately caused the cave-ins by knocking on the supports of the walls! Good or bad? – they were seen by some as benevolent and others as malevolent! It was thought the Knockers did not like the noise miners made and that they really disliked whistling. When disturbed, Knockers would mischievously throw stones at the miners and some miners stated they would also steal or hide their tools. Appeasing The Knockers – Cornish tin miners would leave offerings for the Knockers, especially the last piece of their Cornish pasty. This would keep the Knockers on their 'good side' and help to keep 'good relations' so the Knockers would keep telling them about impeding disasters in the mines. It was thought bad luck could happen if offerings were not left for the Knockers and most miners did not whistle either when working as it was believed to bring bad luck. Can you still hear the Knockers today? No one has heard from the Knockers since the closure of the Cornish tin mines. Some locals believe they still live in tunnels under the Cornish Moors and haunt the abandoned mines. Today, tourists who visit the closed mines, still leave bits of pasty for the Knockers, just in-caseIncredible artwork copyright to the amazingly talented Marc Potts.





THE DRIVING QUESTION ABOUT DRIVING - Celia Proudfoot

D.V.L.A. Stands for Driver and Vehicle
Licensing Agency. For the sake of this letter
I am going to change this to Driving.
Values. Learn from our mistakes.
Arguments. The reason for this is that a
couple of months ago I was knocked off my
bike by an elderly driver. Although my bike
was a write off, I luckily escaped with just
lots of bruises. The driver had not seen me
even though I was wearing high viz and was
the only thing on the road, but more
shockingly they did not even realize they
had hit me, and continued to drive on up the



road. This left me thinking about the big dilemma we face, particularly in a rural community, a large percentage of which is retirement age and over, reliant on cars for practiculaties and socialising: When should we stop driving on the grounds of health & safety?

DRIVING: Involves a complex and rapidly repeating cycle of skills and the ability to interact simultaneously with both the vehicle and the external environment. There is no upper age limit on driving - you just have to renew your licence at 70 and then every 3 years.

VALUES: As things stand, doctors have a duty to tell a patient if they feel they should stop driving or inform the DVLA. **The onus is on the patient to pass the information on.**

LEARN FROM OUR MISTAKES: My oldest brother has dementia. He had always loved driving and was a superb driver, navigating the busy streets of London like the back of his hand until one day he found himself somewhere and didn't know where he was. This was when he went to the doctor and told them he thought he might have dementia. My brother stopped driving immediately.

ARGUMENTS: Oh goodness, there are so many of these amongst caring and distraught families! My cousin took the car keys away from his dad. My husband took the car keys away from his dad after his mum had refused to get in the car with his dad because she was terrified about the deterioration in his driving and so worried he would end up killing someone. Big family arguments where you are accused of not caring, of taking precious freedom away (so precious). And when our backs are up against the wall and the rug is being pulled from under us we don't act logically. I would not dream of preaching and pointing fingers. It is not my place. I really hope that when I reach the point where I am a risk to others, I have the dignity, grace and wherewithal to stop, or accept advice without argument and see the bigger picture. I hope I see that I have had a good innings and I need to allow others the opportunity to have theirs. My husband and I plan, God willing, to move from our beloved Canworthy Water to somewhere with easy access to public transport should the need arise.
