NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH - Mobile phone safety. Aimed at young people but some good advice here for anybody.



Make sure your parents know what you mean when you send a text Before you go out, make sure all the numbers you need are stored on your phone

Make sure your battery is fully charged and that you have credit before leaving the house

Put your friends' numbers in your parents' phones, or write them down, just in case they need to contact you and your phone isn't working

Only give out your mobile number to your friends and family

Don't reply to texts from people you don't know

When you're out and about don't keep your phone on display and put it on vibrate, so only you know when it's ringing

Don't walk and text at the same time, you won't know what's going on around you If you don't have any credit, you can still call 999 if you need to

112 is the international emergency telephone number, it will put you through to the emergency services even if you are elsewhere in Europe

If your phone is out of action, you can call 100 or 0800 REVERSE (7383773) in a phone box to reverse charges and call home

Store a number to contact in case of an emergency under ICE (In Case of Emergency) in the contacts list in your phone

Follow your school rules about mobile phones.

If your can, lock your phone. It means if someone takes it, they can't use it Only give your telephone number to people you trust.

If you get a nasty text message, don't reply, but tell a grown up you trust.

THE SPOOKY HOUSE WESTWARD HO!

Its present owner is going to restore her to its former Victorian glory, which we think is amazing. If you want to see what this house looks like inside, the present series of 'Help, My House is Haunted' which is on Discovery Plus will soon be running an episode dedicated to Seafield House. It is estimated that every year 92 billion kilos of textile waste is produced worldwide. Whilst some of this is recycled, textiles make up around 7% of global waste going to Landfill.

According to a recent study, the UK is the fourth largest producer of textile waste in Europe, with each person discarding around 3.1kg of textiles every year, resulting in 1.7kg of fashion waste being sent to landfill yearly per person.



Clothing is difficult to recycle as it is made up of so many different materials, even pure cotton items may have been made with polyester thread, zips, buttons etc containing plastic, metal and man-made fibres.

There is a need for all of us to reduce the amount of clothing we buy, to re-use items we no longer want - by selling them on at vintage and pre-loved sales, charity shop donations or by making them into something else - and recycling items that are worn out or beyond repair. This



would save us all money - directly at the point of purchase (or non-purchase!) and indirectly by reducing the amount of textile waste being collected and transported around the world.

The fashion industry clearly has a role to play and some clothing manufacturers are

looking for more sustainable ways to source, make and recycle their products. The industry also uses huge amounts of energy and water during the manufacturing process. However it is fast becoming a trend to mend and alter clothing and to re-use fabrics from old clothes, duvet covers, curtains etc, to make new garments, bags, cushions, household items - the list is endless!

Perhaps we need to value our clothes much more and consider whether they are really at the end of their life and not just dated in terms of style, or colour. Could they be updated with an alteration or a colourful addition? There are lots of websites for inspiration on how to upcycle clothes and accessories - why not have a look and create your own

May actually behaved like a true summer month for once, starting with 19°C on the 1st with just a light rain shower early. Northern France was noted as having extensive thunderstorms by late evening which spread along the Channel into the southeast of the country but didn't trouble us at all. The following week was on the cool side, but better by the 8th with 22°C recorded here at Canworthy Water by early afternoon. It got to 24°C on the following day and also on the 10th, with dry conditions and light ESE winds. Clear conditions in the evening to late pm was indeed most fortunate, as enhanced solar activity the previous few days produced a G5 geomagnetic storm which gave an exceptional Aurora visible by 2300 in North Cornwall. This was bright enough to produce weak shadows and was notable in the banding and rays visible which varied in shades of pink, red and green. The display was visible for some hours.

Matters remained fairly dry until the 16th, when what looked like a normal shower development in the afternoon turned out considerable convective activity with a torrential downpour late afternoon around 1700. This gave 20mm of rain collected here in 25 minutes and thunder was heard although at a distance. A thunderstorm was observed to the east of Launceston on the 21st, it was quite intense but kept its distance.

The rest of May produced no weather of note, and the total rainfall collected here was exactly 3", 76 mm against my 10 year average of 2.49", 63mm.

June was notable as having very little in the way of rain until the 14th, when 0.79" was collected by late evening with further wet conditions the following day. Generally quite cool throughout the month with only the 29th giving anything like what one would expect at 23.6°C by mid-afternoon. All rather disappointing......

A total of 1.78", 45mm was collected against my 10 year average of 2.96", 75mm.



Our May speaker was Paul Martin, a local man who has appeared in the TV series "Doc Martin" for all 10 series filmed over 22 years; firstly as an extra and, in later years, as a body double for the Doc himself. Paul was keen to emphasise that it was not all glamour! Extras are given 24 hours notice and often provide their own clothes. Filming was normally from 9am until late and was often done in very cold weather with bright lights simulating sunshine although the actors had to be in summer clothes. Don't believe everything you see on screen!

Paul enjoyed being involved, it was a very happy set and all the actors were extremely friendly. Following this experience, Paul has continued to appear as an extra in several tv dramas and films, including the series "Beyond Paradise" when many of the outside shots were filmed in Launceston.

In June, we were delighted to welcome Martin Brooks, our local Pilates teacher. Martin has been teaching Pilates for over 14 years and shared his experience of becoming a teacher following a back injury 25 years ago. He explained that Pilates can help with many skeletal conditions and can also supplement other treatments for joint pain in areas such as hips and backs to help avoid surgery.

Martin quizzed the group about the name and purpose of various body joints and muscles and worked through a variety of gentle exercises to assist with joint pain and mobility issues. He explained that there may be many reasons for joint pain and how it is essential to maintain good posture to help relieve joint pain. He used his spine model "George" to explain how nerves connect to our joints via the spinal column. His overall message was "keep moving" if at all possible as our bodies are designed to be active.






They weren't even fussed when I opened the kitchen door and went out in my dressing gown, getting my slippers soaking wet on the wet grass.
